He has a B.A. in physics from Gustavus Adolphus College in St. Peter, Minn. and a Master's degree from the Missouri School of Journalism.

Kevin Quealy has helped create some of the Times' best known graphics, including visualizations of the 2010 congressional elections, the interactive "national budget puzzle," "Usain Bolt vs. 116 years of Olympic sprinters," and many others.


