Scarecrow Essay Structure

- 1. When building a scarecrow, you start by making a head. Similarly, when writing an essay, you begin with an introduction. An introductory paragraph should include a hook that grabs the reader's attention and background information about your topic.
- 2. To continue building your scarecrow, place the head of your scarecrow on a supporting stick. The stick in your essay is your thesis statement because it is the central argument that runs through the paper. Typically, a thesis statement is one sentence that comes at the end of your introduction.
- 3. Next, begin building the body of your scarecrow. The body of an essay should support the thesis statement. You can think of your first **body paragraph** as your scarecrow's shirt. Remember that a body paragraph should start with a topic sentence that introduces the topic of that paragraph. In addition, body paragraphs should include supporting details in the form of direct quotes, statistics, and/or paraphrases or summaries.
- 4. Think of the supporting details as the straw of your scarecrow because it fills out each body paragraph.
- 5 & 6. You might wish to include two more body paragraphs, represented by the scarecrow's two pant legs. Again, you must remember to include a topic sentence and supporting details in each paragraph.
 - 7. The last step is putting shoes on your scarecrow. This is the **conclusion** paragraph of your paper. In your conclusion, restate your thesis statement, wrap-up what you've talked about, and give your reader a "so-what," where you inform readers why they should care about what you've written.
